EDITORS' CHOICE/STAFF PICKS FROM THE BOOK REVIEW

CLOUD CUCKOO LAND, by Anthony Doerr. (Scribner, \$30.) Weaving narratives from three eras across most of a millennium, from Constantinople in the 15th century to a space pilgrimage in the 22nd, Doerr's first novel since "All the Light We Cannot See" offers a paean to the consolations of storytelling, and to the people who pass down ancient texts.

THE ONES WHO DON'T SAY THEY LOVE YOU:

Stories, by Maurice Carlos Ruffin. (One World, \$26.) The stories in Ruffin's debut collection (following a 2019 novel, "We Cast a Shadow") cast 21st-century New Orleans as a lost old world, at risk of displacement from gentrification, racial strife and the lingering effects of Hurricane Katrina.

HARLEM SHUFFLE, by Colson Whitehead. (Doubleday, \$28.95.) After winning the Pulitzer Prize for each of his last two novels, Whitehead here delivers a rollicking crime caper set in the Harlem of the 1950s and '60s, when social upheaval was just starting to roil the neighborhood. The highlight of the novel is a brilliantly executed robbery of the famed Hotel Theresa.

INSEPARABLE, by Simone de Beauvoir. Translated by Sandra Smith. (Ecco, \$26.99.) Written in 1954 but never before published, this brief novel by the great French feminist was inspired by her friendship with a brilliant classmate, who died at 21 of a viral illness. Chronicled with sensitivity and passion, that relationship, Beauvoir's book suggests, was the formative one of her youth; no wonder Sartre, who read the manuscript, didn't care for it.

SAY IT LOUD! On Race, Law, History, and Culture, by Randall Kennedy. (Pantheon, \$30.) This collection of essays offers a full portrait of Kennedy's thinking as a law professor and public intellectual, demonstrating his commitment to reflection over partisanship, thinking over feeling.

ALPHA: Eddie Gallagher and the War for the Soul of the Navy SEALs, by David Philipps. (Crown, \$28.99.) Philipps tells the story of a Navy SEAL who was credibly accused of murdering an Iraqi prisoner of war but won acquittal as well as the widely publicized support of President Donald Trump.

SEEING GHOSTS: A Memoir, by Kat Chow. (Grand Central, \$28.) Nearly two decades after her mother's death, when Chow was just 13, her family is still in deep mourning, an experience she documents with wit, poignancy and fresh insight and imagery.

A GHOST IN THE THROAT, by Doireann Ni Ghriofa. (Biblioasis, paper, \$16.95.) This powerful blend of memoir and literary investigation begins with the author's obsession with an 18th-century Irish poem. But it's far from dusty scholarship; Ni Ghriofa weaves past and present, dreams and harsh reality, in an account of motherhood and transformation.

SMILE: The Story of a Face, by Sarah Ruhl. (Simon & Schuster, \$27.) Soon after the birth of her twins, the award-winning playwright was diagnosed with Bell's palsy, which robs her of something she had taken for granted: her smile. "This is the story of my asking it to come back," Ruhl writes in this miracle-free but affecting memoir.

THE SWORD AND THE SHIELD: The Revolutionary Lives of Malcolm X and Martin Luther King Jr., by Peniel E. Joseph. (Basic, 400 pp., \$18.99.) Arguing for a "new interpretation" of these two iconic civil rights leaders — in what our reviewer, Annette Gordon-Reed, called an "immensely valuable" book — Joseph suggests that while they may have been polar opposites at the start, they gradually moved toward each other before their assassinations.

CONDITIONAL CITIZENS: On Belonging in America,

by Laila Lalami. (Vintage, 208 pp., \$16.) The acclaimed Moroccan-born novelist writes about what it's like "for a country to embrace you with one arm and push you away with the other," or, as our reviewer, Sonia Nazario, put it, to be "simultaneously regarded as America's best hope and its gravest threat."

WE RUN THE TIDES, by Vendela Vida. (Ecco, 288 pp., \$16.99.) Set at a girls school in 1984 San Francisco, this sixth novel by the co-founder of the culture magazine The Believer "captures the unstable sensation of early adolescent reality, that period teetering between childhood and young adulthood in which outlandish lies can seem weirdly plausible and basic facts totally alien," our reviewer, Molly Fischer, observed.

THE GLORIOUS AMERICAN ESSAY: One Hundred Essays From Colonial Times to the Present, edited and with an introduction by Phillip Lopate. (Anchor, 928 pp., \$20.) "Give in" to this book's "choral quality," in which the histories of America and American essays are intertwined, John Williams wrote in The Times, and you feel "the dialogical nature of our grandest ideas and most persistent struggles."

ABE: Abraham Lincoln in His Times, by David S. Reynolds. (Penguin, 1,088 pp., \$22.) This "prodigious and lucidly rendered" character portrait of the 16th president vis-à-vis the sociocultural forces of his lifetime, in our reviewer Robert W. Merry's words, "goes further than most previous studies in probing the complexities and nuances of the man: his tastes, likes, dislikes, the quality of his thinking, the evolution of his ideas."

THE SILENCE, by Don DeLillo. (Scribner, 144 pp., \$16.) "The master," according to our reviewer, Joshua Cohen, of "pointing the novel toward novelty" while "writing about the present," DeLillo here ups the apocalyptic ante: On Super Bowl Sunday 2022, "humans deprived of technology resign themselves... not just to individual death but to cultural death, the end of the world, the end of time."
